CELEBRATING AJASS

The African Jazz Arts Society and Studios (AJASS) was founded as the Jazz-Art Society in 1956 by a group of Black teenagers and young adults, many of whom lived in the Morrisania section of The Bronx. According to a late founding member of the organization and prolific community historian Bob Gumbs, Morrisania was known to residents at the time as "The Harlem of The Bronx," and for good reason. At the time of its founding, the Jazz-Art Society sought to promote the African cultural roots of jazz and was particularly tuned into the scene centered at Club 845, located at 845 Prospect Avenue in The Bronx. Jazz legends Thelonious Monk, Dizzy Gillespie, Dexter Gordon, Charlie Parker, Dina Washington, and Art Blakey, to name a few, all performed here during this period.

Although Bob Gumbs passed in 2022, he was one of the leaders of The Bronx African American History Project, a community-based oral history project jointly begun by Fordham University and The Bronx County Historical Society in 2002. Bob was personally involved in more than 100 of the 300+ oral histories recorded for the project thus far. Bob's legacy lives on through the tremendous archive of Black life in The Bronx he has left behind as well as the continuation of the project today, which now documents Black life in many areas of the borough.

Two other founding members of AJASS, Elombe Brath and his younger brother Kwame Brathwaite, organized beauty pageants in The Bronx and Harlem that celebrated the African roots and identity of Black Americans. Out of these pageants were born the Grandassa Models, a Black modeling troupe that featured



all-natural hairstyles, African fashions, and body positivity during a time period, the 1950s and 1960s, when these were considered utterly taboo in U.S. fashion. Indeed, the groundbreaking efforts of AJASS and the Grandassa Models in this regard helped spawn the Black is Beautiful Movement, which instilled national consciousness and pride in Black Americans throughout the 1960s and 1970s.

Bob Gumbs, Elombe Brathe, Kwame Braithwaite, and other members of AJASS were also accomplished graphic and visual artists who helped shape the wider Black Arts Movement that swept New York City during this period. Members of AJASS simultaneously became involved in community activism in New York City as well as international solidarity, with a particular emphasis on African liberation, especially anti-apartheid struggles in South Africa. Kwame Braithwaite was instrumental, for example, in bringing Nelson Mandela to New York City in 1990. In short, AJASS left an indelible mark on many different aspects of music, culture, style, art, and politics in New York City and elsewhere, and it all started here in The Bronx.
